Reflections of Father David

The Four Horsemen of the Apocalypse

Now I saw when the Lamb opened one of the seven seals, and I heard one of the four living creatures say, as with a voice of thunder, "Come!" And I saw, and behold, a white horse, and its rider had a bow; and a crown was given to him and he went out conquering and to conquer. When he opened the second seal, I heard the second living creature say, "Come!" And out came another horse, bright red; its rider was permitted to take peace from the earth, so that men should slay one another; and he was given a great sword. When he opened the third seal, I heard the third living creature say, "Come!" And I saw, and behold, a black horse, and its rider had a balance in his hand; and I heard what seemed to be a voice in the midst of the four living creatures saying, "A quart of wheat for a denarius, and three quarts of barley for a denarius, but do not harm oil and wine!" When he opened the fourth seal, I heard the voice of the fourth living creature say, "Come!" And I saw, and behold, a pale horse, and its rider's name was Death, and Hades followed him; and they were given power over a fourth of the earth, to kill with sword and with famine and with pestilence and by wild beasts of the earth.

Revelation 6:1 - 8

When I was in college, I received a tape by a Christian artist named Debbie Kerner. One song on the tape was about the four horsemen of the Apocalypse and used Revelation 6 as a basis for its message. For some reason I woke up one morning with the tune and those words in my head. I had not thought of that song in years.

During the morning I took a few minutes, sorted through some tapes I had not looked at in years, found the Debbie Kerner tape, and listened to that song. I found it as haunting now as I did almost 30 years ago. After listening to the tape a time or two, I got out several of my Bibles to see how close her lyrics were to the actual Bible reading. She was fairly faithful to the words, and very faithful to the spirit and meaning.

In light of world events over the past six months, I found myself thinking of this song very often as the days of Lent slowly came to an end. I kept asking myself, "Are we living in the end times?" "Is the second coming of the Lord right around the corner?" If it is, "Am I ready for the return of Christ and is my spiritual house in good order?"

I don't have an answer to any of these questions. It is certainly possible that the end times are upon us. Likewise, they may be hundreds and hundreds of years from now, and we simply feel like Paul did when he was sure that he

would live to see the second coming of Christ. Regardless, we should live as if the return of Christ WAS going to occur tomorrow at 9 a.m.

Easter is our key to tomorrow and is why I am not worried that I cannot answer questions regarding when the end times will occur. We are invited to put our faith in the life, teachings, death and resurrection of Jesus and to accept his gift of the "no strings attached" forgiveness of our sins. If we believe in the power of Jesus, and in Jesus only, we will have life everlasting and not have to worry about what will happen to us when the four horses of the Apocalypse come.

We have received the invitation from God. Easter is the proof of God's love for each of us. All we need do is accept and enter into new life everlasting.

May God bless and keep you this Holy Easter Season.

Reverend Carol's message

God's Time

Time is something we are all aware. In fact, much, if not all, of our life is bedded in the hands of the clock. These numbers tell us that it is time to get up, it is time to rush through breakfast, and we only have 20 minutes to get to work when it takes 25 with no lights. Yes, time is a thing, but it is more than that, it is a mind-set, it is a gift at one moment and a demon at another. It feels so good to be able to take your time to get somewhere. It's a feeling that is almost life-giving. The problem is we don't experience it to very often, and when we do, we wish this could be the way we lived the rest of our lives.

Time is something that is a given -- what is 6 p.m. today will be 6 p.m. tomorrow. We don't question it, we don't debate it; time simply is. And that simple statement is true of our lives as well. We are what we make ourselves. If we wish to rush every morning, then that is the way we run our lives. We could go to bed earlier, we could get up earlier, or we maybe we could rearrange our work schedule. What it takes we could do it ... but so often we don't. Why? Because we have not decided that time is something we control instead of it controlling us. We complain about having too much to do, yet, we don't do anything about it, but do more, or complain about what we do, and never reduce our load. Sometimes, there might be a status about having lots to do, it makes us sound and feel important. Well, if that is what you want, go for it. But if we want to have a life that is under control, we need to do a couple of things.

One of these things is to decide "I" control my time, the second is to understand that, if what we choose to do about time does not give us a sense of peace and comfort, than we need to get back to square one. We all need to have a place where we are not worried about time, nor are we worried about what we are doing in that time, rather it accomplishes any thing or not, it is ours to with as we please.

The third thing is to give this time a meaning that has meaning to us. And it is here that God's time comes in. We need to spend time with God, not giving time, but spending time, we need to be in His time zone. We need to be in His being, not in ours. God's time zone has no beginnings and endings, it has no element that gives a sense of time spent. When one is with God, time does not exist. It is a man made element, that has nothing to do with God, except what we have placed there by our own need to have a beginning and an end. We have the need, we made up the clock, we set our own standards, now we expect God to obey them. God does not work on a time line, God works in a love circle. The love circle has no restrictions on it, when love sees it is time for the "thing" to happen then it will, until then we wait.

Time is a man-made thing. It is there so there might be organization and expectations, but it is not there to judge God, nor to give God our master plan with our own time allocations on it.

If we can understand more about God's time of love, and less of our time going and coming to beat the clock, we would have a grace in our lives we would want for ever. Control time, make the choices that enable you to be in God's love time, instead of your own created time line.

EFM – opening doors for life

As I reflect on what I have learned this year in EFM, so much comes to mind. There's the obvious knowledge gained from reading the Bible and sharing, but Education for Ministry is much more than a Bible study class. It is truly education for life with part of that being ministry. Since we are all called to love God and one another and to serve and minister to one another, this program is right for everyone from all walks of life. God speaks to all of us and needs all of us.

Two things stand out to me as I reflect on what I have learned. Traveling through the Old Testament, from Adam and Eve to the travels and troubles of the early Israelites, I have seen that everything was about relationships. Their stories speak about their association with God and their connections with one another. We hear this in church in prayer, teachings, psalms, songs and more, but what has been insightful is the "personalness" of God, and that we are ALL worthy and called to be in relationship with HIM. God the creator seeks to be in relationship, to have more than a bond - to be in an interactive relationship with us.....ALL of usall of the time. Christianity isn't as much about religion as it is about relationship. Ask yourself, "What is God saying to me in this event or situation?" as you face each day.

Further insight is gained from our theological reflection which is often the greater focus in our classes. We believe we are religious people. We attend church, are active in various phases of church work, and we try to live a "good" life. In one part of theological reflection, we take biblical text, forms of worship -- prayer, psalms, song -- and apply it to current life situations. EFM has been simply, yet profoundly, applying the Bible to life today. It is seeking the sense and the meaning then and now. It is seeing how patterns of man and God, while ever-changing, are ever-constant and even predictable at times, showing how truly Christ is the alpha and the omega, the beginning and the end.

Much more comes from this class. It is a personal and communal learning experience. Our facilitator is great. We are on various journeys and you can be too! ☩

More from the library

We have two excellent books by John Hunt and Gary Smalley: The Blessing and The Gift of Honor. I can recommend these to everybody.

The Blessing inspires us, as Christians, of the importance of being a blessing to all. The authors concentrate first on how we are to give our children "The Blessing"; this is traced with ample Biblical examples. A series of specifics are discussed, beginning with 1) meaningful touch, 2) spoken words, 3) placing high value, and 4) picturing a special future for each. These principles are also extended to our spouses, friends, church and even our parents.

I cried when I read "Write your parents a letter," as both of mine are many years dead. Yet, as I performed this exercise, great joy and gratitude flooded to me in return so many times over. I am also now more conscious than ever before of my words to my children and others and anticipate each encounter with a resolve to give and say words of blessing and honor.

The second book, The Gift of Honor, continues the same theme in a broader context. Both of these two books not only enhance our resolve to follow Jesus, but are avenues to healing in all relationships.

May God bless you richly in the reading of these books and encourage and challenge you to be a person of blessing.
