Reflections of Father David

*Why were the saints, saints?
Because they were cheerful
When it was difficult to be cheerful,
Patient when it was difficult to be patient,
And because they pushed on
When they wanted to stand still,
And kept silent when they wanted to talk,
And were agreeable when they wanted to be disagreeable.*

That was all. It was quite simple and always will be.

A wonderful friend returned this quote to me, reminding me how some years ago I used it in an article I wrote on All Saints. I had long forgotten the article and haven't a clue where I originally found the quote. Since Mary Jane returned it to me, I have kept it under the glass blotter on my desk as a reminder of the many saints who fill my daily life.

With the arrival of this newsletter, the Christian year will be swiftly drawing to a close. As the month of November quietly ebbs away, the days grow shorter and shorter and the cold wind reminds us that winter is just around the corner.

Almost like a final hurrah, the church gives us two grand celebrations, All Saints Day on November 1st and the Feast of Christ The King on the last Sunday before the beginning of Advent. The first celebration focuses on people, the latter on the person of Christ.

Most of us have no problem thinking about Christ in his many manifestations. We experience him as teacher, friend, shepherd, guide, Son of God, the second person of the Trinity. For many, Christ is as alive and present in their lives today as He was in the lives of the disciples when he physically walked the streets of Palestine some 2,000 years ago.

The saints are often harder to experience. Many people think that, other than someone like Mother Teresa, a saint is someone who is a "super" Christian in every way. Saints have halos and are not bothered by the small irritations that so afflict our lives. Saints are larger than life and unapproachable. Take a modern day superstar sports personality, wrap him or her in "religious-osity" and you come close to having a saint.

In truth, most "saints" never consider themselves saints. They are simple, honest, dedicated followers of Christ trying to the best of their ability, using the gifts God has given them, to live a life fully in Christ,

Saints look just like you and me. They stumble and fall just as we do. They are filled with the same fears and sense of doubt which beset all of us.

Certainly there are extraordinary people like Mary Magdalene, Francis of Assisi, Margaret of Scotland, Samuel Seabury, Samuel Isaac Joseph Schereschewsky (I just love his name!), Mother Teresa, and David of Wales. These and countless others in our [Lesser Feasts and Fasts](#) serve as constant reminders of the sacrifices made over the centuries in the service of Christ. We honor and celebrate the lives of these saints, their witness and ministries.

We must also remember that there are many, many living saints still surrounding us today. For the most part we don't see them as they go around serving, sacrificing, being Christ present in the world. They do what they do because they are called to minister in the name of Christ. They do not ask for accolades. Most will never make it into [Lesser Feasts and Fasts](#). The majority of the world will never know their names, They do what they do, not for honor and acclaim, but because they love the Lord they serve

Take a few minutes and think about the "saints" in your lives Say a special prayer and give thanks to God for all the many things your "saints" do and how much they mean to you. Spend a few minutes and write a note of appreciation to them, for their ministry. In doing so, you will bless them and make them more cheerful, give them greater patience, help them to move on, grant them a holy silence, and help them be even more agreeable. "That is all. It is quite simple and always will be".

May God always bless and keep you.

Reverend Carol's message

The Bible... What is it?

We read the Bible at every service we do in the Episcopal Church, yet how many of us know what it is? Really? Did you know that the word Bible means library? Or that this book actually is made up of 66 separate books? There are 39 books in the Old Testament and 27 books in the new Testament. I'll give you a little hint on how to remember that. Remember that Jack Benny never wanted to be over 39 years of age, or who else does? Well, if you can remember this little tidbit, then there are 39 books in the Old Testament because you don't want to be old. And $3 \times 9 = 27$, or there are 27 books in the New. That may seem a bit complicated but I'll bet you will never forget it!

The Old Testament has all kinds of books in it. For instance, there are history books, prophetic books, poetry, law, and apocalyptic books. All of these make up the living history of the Hebrew people and the life of God's people before the birth of His son. In these books, we find God and people trying to come to grips with each other, and discovering what the true meaning of worshipping God really would mean to them and to the generations to come.

Then in the New Testament there are the four Gospels of Matthew, Mark, Luke, and John. Now three of these books have a special name, the synoptic gospels, because they contain some of the same materials and stories. The word synoptic means the same or like. John is not one of the synoptics because the Gospel of John contains images and information that is not found in the other three. John's gospel is known for the "I am" statements of Jesus: "I am the vine, you are the branches", "I am the son of man", "I am the light", and so on. There are seven "I am" statements in all.

Another interesting piece of information is that Mark does not contain any reference to the birth of Jesus and that his gospel was the first written. Matthew has the genealogy of Jesus in it and was written to attract the Jews to the Christian faith. The gospel of Luke was written to the gentiles and has the majority of the healing stories in it, since Luke was a physician. Luke was also the author who wrote the Acts of the Apostles, which is the history book of the New Testament.

We then make our way to the epistles. Epistle means letter, so what we are really reading are the letters sent by these writers to the various Christian communities throughout the world as it was then. Paul wrote most of the epistles, and with his unusual and awkward way of writing, it is not hard to spot which ones are his. Paul wrote with broken sentences, complicated wording of this thoughts, and in the middle of one thought he would all of a sudden change the subject and start another. But with all of his style of "weirdness" he has much to say about our Christian faith and our spirituality. Peter, James, John, Titus and others all have much to offer us in their stories and the messages they bring to us in the words of their epistles and writings.

We then come to the book of Revelation. This is the apocalyptic book of the New Testament, which tells us of the end of the age, or the end of the world as we know it. The book is full of imagines and symbolic happenings that are not easy to understand. However, the series which has become quite popular recently, the "Left Behind" series, is fashioned after the book of Revelation.

Now that we know a little about the structure and the function of this book, it may be a little easier for us to read it and understand what impact it can have on our lives, if we just let it. This book invites us into a world that is of God. It is a world that is not like any other. For in reading God's word, we become more of what he would have us become. There is little reason to read God's word unless we are there to be changed and learn of his hand in history since the creation of the world. We read his word so that we may be different after having read it. We read it because we want to be more like he would have us be. And we read it to understand what the salvation, death, and resurrection of his Son means to our lives in this day and time.

The Bible is a timeless book; there are no limits to its relevance to our world. We only need to let it speak to us, to our hearts, and to our minds. The only real question is will we let it speak to us, or will we put it back on the shelf where it can once again collect dust?

Gepert elected Bishop

From the Western Michigan Episcopalian

Episcopalians in western Michigan elected the Very Rev. Robert R Gepert to become the 8th Bishop of the Diocese of Western Michigan when the present bishop, the Rt. Rev. Edward L. Lee, Jr., retires at the end of June 2002. The Convention met at the Radisson Hotel in downtown Kalamazoo October 19-20th.

The Search Committee, commissioned by the Convention in 2001, used the Vision statement developed in the Diocese over a two year period to develop a Bishop Profile indicating the talents, qualities and gifts the Diocese was seeking in a new bishop. At the end of their process, the Search Committee presented three names: the Very Rev. Robert R. Gepert, Dean of Trinity Cathedral in Easton, Maryland (Diocese of Easton); the Rev. Kenneth Near, Rector of St. Paul's Church in Englewood, New Jersey (Diocese of Newark); and the Very Rev. John S. Smylie, Dean of the Cathedral of St. John the Evangelist in Spokane, Washington (Diocese of Spokane).

A fourth nominee was presented using the petition process set in place by the 2001 Convention to eliminate nominations from the floor in order for appropriate background checks to be made. The Rev. David R. Pike, Rector of St. David's Church in Lansing, Michigan (Diocese of Western Michigan) was nominated by petition from six clergy and six lay persons.

Gepert led both the clergy and lay votes in the first ballot, and on the second ballot had the required majority of clergy votes. The lay delegates gave him their needed majority on the third ballot.

A native of Pittsburgh, Pennsylvania, Bob Gepert received a B. S. degree (biology) from Point Park College and taught high school for eleven years outside of Washington, D.C. A former Roman Catholic, he became an Episcopalian and acted on a call to priesthood he had experienced since his childhood. He received an M.Div. degree from Virginia Theological

Seminary in 1985 and was ordained in the Diocese of Washington. Following his ordination, Gepert served congregations in the Diocese of Washington and the Diocese of Bethlehem, and now serves as dean of Trinity Cathedral in the Diocese of Easton. Each of these congregations experienced significant growth during his tenure. Gepert is 53, and he and his wife, Anne, have seven adult children and eight grandchildren. Anne is a liturgical fabric artist.

In other business, the clergy and lay delegates elected deputies and alternates for the 2003 General Convention, members for the Standing Committee and the Ecclesiastical Court. There were no canonical changes presented. A resolution was submitted asking delegates to pledge "to model and direct their beliefs, both as individuals and as a Diocese, after the pattern" set out in Holy Scripture. A substitute resolution broadened the resolution to include Tradition, Reason and Experience in classical Anglican style.

A resolution asking for the Diocese to study animal rights was tabled pending further information on what materials would be studied concerning "our treatment of nonhuman animals and the effects of this treatment on our lives as Christians."

A diocesan budget of \$818,448 received considerable discussion in the area of the health care benefits for lay employees and clergy, particularly retired clergy and their spouses. The budget was amended to continue the existing pattern of health care benefits and to increase revenue accordingly with the delegates pledging to take this challenge back to their congregations.

According to the transition time line of the Diocese, Gepert, now termed the "bishop coadjutor-elect," will be ordained a bishop April 27, 2002 at the Fountain Street Church in Grand Rapids, assuming that a majority of the bishops and the Standing Committees of the 115 Episcopal Dioceses in the United States concur with this diocesan election. This action is required since a bishop also participates in the national House of Bishops of the Episcopal General Convention in

the oversight of the Episcopal Church in the USA. Gepert will become the 8th Bishop of the Diocese of Western Michigan July 1, 2002. ✕

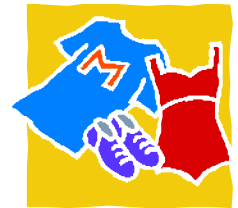
