"I always think of September as a time of warm colours," said Dame Mildred. There was clear sunshine, and in her flower beds was the rich gold of rudbeckia, deep purple and rose from Michaelmas daisies, flaring dahlias, and in the vegetable garden scarlet runner beans, tomatoes, dark-veined cabbages. The garth seemed to glow, and the liturgy of these days added its especial truth and beauty to the whole.

As many of you know, Autumn is my favorite season of the year. I love the cooler temperatures, the wonderful colors of the autumn flower beds, the incredible blue of the sky, the vivid colors of the leaves on the trees. Perhaps most of all, I love getting back into the swing of things around the church.

This was an incredible summer. I still delight in the time you granted me to visit England, and especially, St. David's in Wales. As always, vacation time spent with family and friends was relaxing and greatly enjoyed. With Jennifer in college, this may be the last summer we vacation as a family in the way we have done for 18 years.

Fr. David Nominated for Bishop

The Rev. David Robert Pike, rector of St. David's Episcopal Church in Lansing, has been nominated for bishop of Western Michigan through the petition process which allows persons to be nominated in addition to those presented by the Search Committee.

The petition process required the support and signature of six persons, three clergy representing a minimum of two different deaneries, and three lay persons also representing a minimum of two different deaneries. Clergy nominating the Rev. David Pike include the Revs. Roy Meyers (Grand Valley), Scott Anderson (Grand Valley), Carol Spangenberg (Eastern), James Gunn (Traverse), John Myers (Traverse) and Theodore Sirotko (Lakeshore). Lay persons signing the petition include Ms Katherine Hansma (Grand Valley), Mr. Ralph Mumper (Grand Valley), Mr. John Post (Eastern), Mr. Ronald Willey (Traverse), Mr. Louis Zako (Traverse), and Mr. Thomas Merchant (Lakeshore).

The Rev. David Pike was born April 1, 1955. He received a B.A. degree from Grand Valley State College in Grand Rapids in 1977 and a MDiv degree from the Episcopal Divinity School in Cambridge, MA in 1982. He was ordained a deacon in 1982 by Bishop Charles E. Bennison, then bishop of the Diocese of Western Michigan. He was ordained a priest by Bishop Bennison in December of that year.

Pike served as curate at St. Paul's Church in Muskegon (1982-84), as rector of St. James' Church in Albion and Episcopal chaplain at Albion College (1984-1993), and as rector of St. David's in Lansing from 1993 to the present. In the Diocese he has served as a member of the Cathedral Corporation, Dean of the Eastern Deanery, Spiritual Advisor for the Diocesan Cursillo Secretariat, Camp and Happening chaplain, Deputy from the Diocese to two General Conventions, and a member of the Executive

Council. Pike, and his wife, Nancy, have two children.

The same background check was made on him as that made for the Search Committee's three nominees. In addition Pike has responded to the same questions asked by the Search Committee.

Unlike the Search Committee's nominees, Pike will not be part of the "Walkabout" sessions at which the three nominees will be introduced and questioned further by both the Search Committee and persons attending the sessions. This is similar to what would have happened in the past with nominations from the floor of the electing Convention, something which was ruled out by a change in the diocesan canons at the Diocesan Convention last year.

All four nominees will be nominated at Convention with a three minute nominating speech and a two minute seconding speech. Votes are taken separately by clergy and lay delegates, and the nominee with the majority of votes in both orders will be elected. The Transition Committee will then inform the nominee he has become bishop-elect of the Diocese. All four nominees have signed a form indicating they would accept to become bishop if elected.

The bishop-elect will be ordained a bishop April 27, 2002 at the Fountain Street Church in Grand Rapids, and become replace the Rt. Rev. Edward Lee as bishop of the Diocese of Western Michigan July 1, 2002. ☩

Study recommends changes in role of Archbishop of Canterbury

An extensive review of the role of the archbishop of Canterbury within the Church of England and as head of the worldwide Anglican Communion has recommended some significant changes.

"It seemed to me both timely and desirable to take a fresh look at the demands and expectations of the office," said Archbishop of Canterbury George L. Carey in a foreword to the report, "To lead and serve." Carey asked for the review and appointed the eight-member review team, headed by Lord Hurd, former British foreign secretary.

"The overwhelming thrust of the evidence given to us is that the present archbishop is carrying out his role effectively with notable courage and wisdom," the report said in its introduction. It added that the team is convinced that "changes in the workload" are necessary, especially in light of increased expectations on the international level.

Among the changes proposed are the appointment of a bishop from outside England to help with Anglican Communion affairs and a greater role within the Church of England for the archbishop of York, the church's other primate.

Acknowledging the stature and importance of the role, the report said, "In some parts of the Communion, for example, there is a tendency to think of the archbishop as a kind of Anglican Pope, able to exercise jurisdiction throughout the Communion. Such a position has neither been claimed nor desired by any archbishop of Canterbury."

Keep diocesan role

The report does not recommend that the archbishop give up his role on the diocesan level. "Divorced from a see, he would be in danger of being seen as an ecclesiastical politician and manager rather than a chief pastor and spiritual leader," the report concluded. It does call for

another bishop to handle many of the regular diocesan responsibilities.

The role as spiritual leader of the Church of England does make it legally impossible for someone outside the church to be named archbishop of Canterbury. But the report concedes that separating the role in the Anglican Communion from the role in Canterbury is an idea that "may well gather strength as the years pass." Lord Hurd said that, at the present time, there was "no effective pressure" for a non-English archbishop of Canterbury, although the idea has support in Japan and Latin America, "countries that are not part of the Commonwealth and not used to comings and goings with Britain."

The archbishop should retain his national role of personal sponsorship of interfaith relations but should be "sparing" in his involvement after initiatives have been launched.

Carey and the review team are seeking responses from around the world on the web site at www.archbishopofcanterbury.org.

In a parallel recommendation, the report said that "there should be renewed attempts to improve the financial position of the Anglican Communion Office so that it may be equipped to discharge the expectations placed upon it." That will require "strengthening the fundraising professionalism" of the office by appointing a development officer.

CAC news

The Capital Area Council (CAC) had its first meeting after summer recess September 24, 2001 at All Saints Church in East Lansing. The Diocese of Michigan has put on hold the restructuring of the area councils due to various concerns voiced by the councils. The diocese sees only six churches in this area council which actually comprises two more due to the participation of St. David's and St. John's of Charlotte. This is one of the issues that was presented to the diocese.

The possibility of a youth leader for the council is also not a feasible project at this time as there will not be any funds available. We will try to keep each other in the council aware of any special youth activities that are being held in our individual churches.

St. Paul's has hired a part-time coordinator for their Sudanese parishioners. He is McCoy Wilken, an Episcopalian from Sudan, who works for Lutheran Social Services. Lutheran Social Services is instrumental in bringing many of the "Lost Boys of Sudan" to the United States. The council is proposing a special rummage sale for the new Sudanese in the spring of 2002 as they establish homes. The need is for household items rather than clothes. Keep this in mind while you go through things in your house. We probably have enough to keep the ECW going and some for this project also. The other need for the Sudanese is for tutors, mainly in English, Reading and Math.

You do not have to be a teacher to tutor. If you are interested, please contact St. Paul's at 482-9454. There is pay involved!

One additional note: anyone needing to update their Lay Eucharistic classes (visitor classes also) may contact St. Katherine's (Williamston) at 349-4120. Ask to speak to the Rev. Linda MacDonald. She teaches these classes. Anyone from St. David's is welcome, you just need to get approval from the Western Diocese.
