# Reflections of Father David

My grandmother's house was truly my childhood home. It was the place we went to as often as possible. It was a place of love and stability. It remains for me a place of healing, growth, and wonderful memories.

It was a typical southern house. The rooms were large, with high ceilings. There was a verandah across the front and a porte-cochere on the side. Wisteria, honeysuckle, crepe myrtle, gardenia, and Rose of Sharon grew rampant in the pecan-tree-filled yard.

When I was a child, grandmother's house had a mystery I couldn't figure out. Her one bathroom was long, narrow and had a high ceiling. The bathtub was a huge, deep, claw-footed tub. Naturally it had a toilet and a sink with a beveled glass medicine cabinet over it. The room also had a linen closet and an upholstered dressing bench. The mystery involved the sink.

Over the sink was a white milk glass light fixture with a single bulb. It was the same style as the one hanging from the center of the ceiling, except the one over the sink was mounted to the wall just over the medicine cabinet. When you turned on the switch by the door, the overhead light came on. The one on the sink did not.

There wasn't a switch nearby to turn it on. It didn't have a pull chain to make it light. There wasn't a twist knob at the base to make it work. When I was a small child, the light never worked.

Then one day, I walked past the bathroom and the light was on! The overhead wasn't on, but the light over the sink was on. It made the bathroom look entirely different. After that, it was a long time before I saw the light on again. Each time, the bathroom looked so different. I continued to wonder how to turn the light on.

Eventually, when I was much older and wiser, I discovered that to make the light work, you had to reach up and twist the bulb firmly into the socket. To turn it off, you had to take a hand towel and unscrew the bulb slightly until the light went off. There was no switch to make it work properly.

I was reminded of my grandmother's bathroom not long ago when a seldom-used lamp in our bedroom was turned on. As with the bathroom, it made the room look so entirely different. The shadows were deeper and the whole focus of the room was changed. The colors of the walls and the quilt were more subtle. The room felt warmer and more snug.

As I said my prayers that morning, I was reminded of how Jesus again and again calls each of us to see people in a different light. We are to view people differently from the way the world sees them. We are to see them as Jesus sees them. Like the light in grandmother's bathroom, it may at first seem a mystery how we are to accomplish this. We may have to reach out and interact with a stranger to acquire this "Christ-like" vision. It may be uncomfortable and even "hot" from time to time.

The end result, once we have stepped out of our comfort zone, is that we will see people in an entirely different way. We will find our world enlarged and we will meet some really neat people. We will find that we grow in ways we had not thought possible. We will begin to see people as Jesus sees them. And the same will be true for how others see us.

May God continue to bless and keep you.

It is time for us to take this summer, above all others, since 9/11, and to enjoy the important things in life, like each other, and the beauty that surrounds us.

Let us give silence and quiet a chance. Let's give God a chance to speak to us, and spend this summer in a more quiet mode, appreciating each other and God's creation. Then we will truly look back on this summer with a different view than one of schedules and organized chaos.

## Williams favored to replace Carey

According to an article in the June 20 issue of the London Times by religion correspondent Ruth Gledhill, Archbishop Rowan Williams of Wales is the first choice of the Crown Appointments Commission to be the next archbishop of Canterbury.

The paper said it had learned that Williams was the first of two names chosen by the commission at its two-day meeting in Surrey last week. The complicated and arcane process requires that commission members are sworn to secrecy, pledging to tell no one, not even family members, about the process. The names will be submitted to Prime Minister Tony Blair in the next few weeks. He is responsible for forwarding a choice to Queen Elizabeth II, although he could return the names to the commission, regarded by most observers as quite unlikely. The queen will make a formal announcement, "probably in the second half of July," according to the paper. ☩

## Remarks for FR. David's 20<sup>th</sup>

[Note: These remarks were delivered at our celebration of Fr. David's 20<sup>th</sup> anniversary as a priest at the Sunday service on June 9, 2002.]

Eleven years ago, our St. David's community faced an uncertain future. We had just lost our priest under the most difficult of circumstances. We had not yet begun a search for a successor, and many questions were raised about our church's needs and how they would be filled.

God sent us three gifts that year.

First, he endowed our search committee with a sense of commitment, compromise and cooperation. A dozen parishioners volunteered to serve on the committee and they came from virtually every conceivable viewpoint. It could not have been a more accurate mirror of our congregation. Our committee members set aside any personal agendas, prejudices, and preferences to look for the best shepherd to lead our flock.

Second, God sent us a stabilizing influence in the person of Tom Spitler. Tom showed up in church one Sunday, a priest recently retired from a diocese in Wisconsin. Eventually, Tom became our interim priest and, with his wife, Peg, stayed on as a permanent member of our St. David's family.

Third, as the year drew to a close, and following months of meetings, mission statement drafts, interviews, and soul-searching, God sent us David, Nancy, Jennifer and Andrew Pike.

Father David, as a congregation and as individuals, we have truly been blessed by your presence among us. Thank you for your patience and your wisdom, your gentle guidance and your instinct for knowing when it's time to give, and when to remain firm. Thank you for your comfort in times of personal tragedy and duress, and for your company in times of celebration

In short, thanks for being here. Let's do this celebration again in about another decade! ✠
